HIGH QUALITY TREE GUARDS AVAILABLE TO RESIDENTS FOR \$4

Tree guards are available for purchase by check or cash at City Hall for \$4 each. Please consider surrounding your new or small trees with tree guards. Fall is the time when deer can quickly do much damage to trees by rubbing their antlers on the bark. Pictured is an example of damage to the limbs and bark of a newly planted tree. If a tree guard will not fit around the trunk, consider installing stakes with plastic fencing (available at home supply stores) around trees. Fencing should be placed at a distance far enough from the tree to prevent the deer from reaching over.

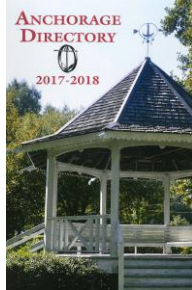
LIGHTING OF THE YULE LOG AND CAROL SING

ANNUAL ALARM REGISTRATION

City Ordinance requires all burglar alarms to be registered with the Anchorage Police Department, regardless if the system is monitored by a security service or not. Registration forms were included in the November edition of *The Anchor Age*.

➤ **Registration forms are due by December 31, 2016.**

There is no charge to register your alarm. However, owners with unregistered alarms can incur civil penalties of up to \$250 a day. Registration forms are available on the city website under City Services/Police Department or at City Hall. Registration forms should be returned to the Police Station or City Hall, or mailed to City of Anchorage, P.O. Box 23266, Anchorage, KY 40223.

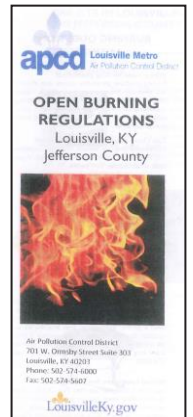
Does Your Fire Pit meet Louisville Metro Guidelines and Requirements?

Fall is the perfect time to enjoy an evening around an outdoor fire pit with family or friends. What may seem like a harmless, enjoyable event may actually be negatively impacting those living around you especially if they suffer from any type of lung disease. It is important to follow proper guidelines and requirements when purchasing/building your fire pit, determining the perfect placement location, and selecting the materials to burn in it.

What we may not realize is that the Louisville Metro Air Pollution Control District (APCD) governs their use, as well as most other types of recreational burning (bonfires, campfires, etc.) and offers an informative pamphlet that summarizes the guidelines and safety requirements and is available free of charge at Anchorage City Hall. The following are a few requirements that may come as a surprise.

According to the APCD, the State Fire Code says that fire pits should be located at least 50 feet away from buildings, property lines, or combustible materials. Do not burn if the wind speed is 15 mph or higher. The fire should be attended by a responsible adult at all times. Only clean dry firewood should be used; no accelerants, no yard waste or debris, and no trash of any kind should be burned. **Burning storm and/or flood debris is prohibited!**

As for the receptacle or device for your recreational fire, fire pits come in many designs, shapes, and sizes. However, according to the APCD, the height should not exceed three feet from the ground or surface on which it rests, and the diameter should not exceed three feet as well, (3 ft. x 3 ft. x 3 ft.). A permit from the APCD usually isn't necessary if the fire pit meets these requirements and the material burned is within the guidelines mentioned above. Should you have any questions about your fire pit receptacle, fire pit location, materials to be burned or whether a permit is required, please call APCD at 502.574.6000 or visit their website at www.louisvilleky.gov/apcd. Always remember to be safe and courteous, too! Please contact Anchorage City Hall before building any permanent structure to determine if a permit from Anchorage is needed.
