Tax payments must be postmarked on or before May 31, 2017 to qualify for the discount, or be postmarked on or before June 30, 2017 to avoid interest charges.

#### TAX PAYMENT DROP OFF

Feel free to drop off your tax payments at City Hall between 8:30 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday. For your convenience and security, afterhours tax payments can be dropped off at the Anchorage Police Department on Park Road.

For security reasons, please do not leave payments under the doormat or attempt to slide them under the door of City Hall.

#### **TAX PAYMENT NOTES**

- Checks should be written for the discounted amount if postmarked on or before May 31, 2017.
- Write your account number on the check.
- Include the payment coupon with the check.
- Sign your check.
- Checks should be made payable to The City of Anchorage.

## FROM THE FORESTRY BOARD

### **MULCHING TIPS FOR HEALTHY TREES**

Properly applied organic mulch can be very beneficial to trees and the soil around them. However, excess or incorrectly applied mulch can be detrimental. The goal of mulching is to mimic a natural system...the forest.

- TreesLouisville recommends the 3-3-3 rule: spread the mulch 3 feet wide, 3 inches deep, and 3 inches away from the trunk.
- Ideally, the mulch should extend to the drip line of the tree's branches, at the least it should reach 3 feet from the trunk.
- Pull mulch away from the trunk of each tree and its root flare to create a *donut* rather than a *volcano*. "Volcano mulching" creates harmful moisture build-up that can cause disease, decay, or even death of the tree.
- If you already have sufficient mulch, you may not need to purchase more but instead may need only to rake to redistribute it and freshen its appearance. Use a gloved hand -- not a tool -- to pull mulch away from the bases of trees and shrubs.

#### **COYOTES IN URBAN AREAS**

Seeing a coyote walking down the road or while walking the trails isn't as uncommon as most would think. People and covotes have coexisted in relative peace for many decades. Coyotes do not require open space to survive, and they are comfortable living in close proximity to humans in




metropolitan areas. They are found in every county in Kentucky, including Jefferson.

Coyotes in urban areas thrive as there is an abundance of food, water, and shelter for them. They play a natural and beneficial role in the food chain by eating mice and other small rodents. But coyote behavior is changing as they find food sources in residential areas, eating garbage, fruit, and accessible pet food; all readily available in residential neighborhoods.

#### **Preventing Conflicts at Your Home**

- Don't leave pets or small children unsupervised in your yard. Don't let your cat roam.
- Never leave food out. Keep pet food indoors, trash in containers with tight fitting lids, and remove fallen fruit from the ground. Clean up spilled seed from around bird feeders to avoid attracting rodents.
- Keep yards free from potential shelter such as thick brush, and enclose the bottoms of porches and decks.

Lawn fertilizers, garden pesticides, and herbicides eventually make their way into the aquatic ecosystem and our drinking water. Carefully follow manufacturer directions and exercise caution when using these chemicals around your home. This is one case where more is not better - never use more product than specified for the task. The cumulative effect of these chemicals and their degradants, even in low levels, adversely affect water quality, aquatic life, wildlife, and public health. Be proactive! Limit chemical use, use less-toxic alternatives, or go organic whenever possible.
